SHOTGUN UPDATE

We had our meeting on Nov 18th. At that time it was asked, what improvements could we make to increase ease of participation in shooting at the range.

First on the list was better lighting for evening shooting. While this is a big ask, we may be able to get better lights that may decrease our electrical costs, which may pay for the lights over time. With the advent of better LED lighting or other types, this could be a worthwhile investment. Second, was investing in new shotguns for the club, with the addition of youth and women's sized gun to increase the participation by these groups. Before spending any funds on new guns, we should set up a group to inspect, clean and service our existing guns to maximize our use of

funds, by not replacing good guns we already have.

Third, was the development of a covered, lit and enclosed area for cleaning of shotguns that would be accessible to the shooters. This would also help in training of the Youth Shotgun League program to let them learn how to properly service their guns and the ones they use during training. It was suggested that this could be attached to the maintenance shed, or possibly off of the 5-Stand shed.

Fourth, was the development of more youth programs. This would include follow on shooting for the Youth Shotgun League, such as a regular league shoot to be scheduled to meet the times that fit with the members. Possibly a youth Multiplex League to introduce them to the sport and ease them into possible competition. This should be discussed with PITA with an aim towards helping them get into shooting their competitions. We should look at quarterly or half yearly youth shotgun program to expose more youths to safe and enjoyable shotgun sports.

Fifth, we should develop a video for the website that shows the diversity of shooters who come to Kenmore, along with the full spectrum of shotgun sports offered at the club. This would give people an introduction to the club, the grounds and the requirements to shoot at the club. We should stress that we are Handicap Accessible, and that their first experience shooting at Kenmore would be an orientation and assistance with their gun handling skills to insure they are able to safely enjoy their shooting experience. We can also show them the full spectrum of Trap, Handicap, Doubles, Continental and 5-Stand, along with our fundamentals class to help them develop their skills. We should emphasize that the range is not only a shooting range, but a social club, where shooters can learn from others, enjoy a coffee and good conversation, as well as breaking some clays.

Sixth, Paul Kalman and I have been corresponding with Richard Clark from premiergamedays.co.uk who is the founder of the British National .410 Championship. Paul shoots a 28ga per physician's orders, and as we have had people drop away from shooting, as the 12ga is not good for their shoulders. Paul and I have been discussing this as a shoot at Kenmore, possibly a 28ga

and .410 shoot on the 5-stand. The British do this on a Sporting Clays course with some modification to the distances. They completed their 5th year, and had 180 shooters attend. While I don't see us hosting that amount, it would be a fun time with friendly competition. We could also see about partnering with another club for a small series, which could benefit both clubs. Seventh, a Side by Side Shotgun shoot, 16yd and/or 5-stand. It would be a simple shoot to arrange, and with the resurgence of Side by Side interest, it could be fun small event. John Abbot sponsors one at Issaguah each year, and we could see about working with him to add shooters to both events. It has been discussed that we should look at making more small shooting events with an informal mature, like a novice shoot for beginning shooters with small prizes. We are getting a number of new shooters attending the club, and they have enjoyed shooting against their friends and learning from more experienced members. We are the best ambassadors for our sport. We should remember when we started, and what helped us want to be a part of the club. A smile, admiring their shotgun and asking how they like it can start a conversation that makes them want to be a part of the club.

CLASSES, WE HAVE CLASSES

SAFARI PRESENTATION

Do you know someone who is looking for basic firearms training? We have NRA certified classes here almost every weekend.

These classes are designed to introduce newcomers to shooting in a safe and welcoming atmosphere.

When the weather is warmer, we have our First Steps Shotgun class on the first Saturday of the month. This is an introduction to shotgun use and basic trap shooting

Basic Pistol is scheduled on the second weekend of each month. Our students learn the fundamentals of both revolvers and semiautomatic pistols.

Home Firearms Safety class is held on the third Saturday of each month. This class is a nonshooting class, covering safe handling of all types of firearms.

Basic Rifle is set for the fourth weekend of the month, using bolt-action rifles. We cover the basics, as well as a bit of position shooting.

Our instructors have recently started offering Metallic Cartridge Reloading classes, usually on the third Sunday of the month.

As well as this lineup of basic courses, we also teach two sessions a year of NRA certified instructor courses. POLITICS AND LEGISLATION

Well, the election was 2 months ago and Christmas was a few days ago. As I wish you all a Happy New Year, I also have to advise you that with we are heading right into the Washington State Legislative session. What that means for us is that the Democrat majority in Olympia will be trying to pass a bunch of new anti-gun bills which will have real consequences for us who live here.

As you all know by now, the Democrats did very well in our state in November. They go into this session with a 29-20 majority in the senate and a 58-40 majority in the House of Representatives once again. This means they can not only pass whatever they want, but they also feel like they were rewarded (or at least not punished) by the voters for their anti-gun moves in previous sessions. The only "good news" is that they did not get a super-majority which means they can't modify the state constitution. While we expect most of their worst legislation to be struck down by the courts eventually, there's no guarantee that will happen and it's taking longer than many of us hoped.

Bill Kirk has done a good job on his YouTube channel, Washington Gun Law, going over the wish-list of bills that are under consideration, so I won't recap that in this limited space. The main thing I want to communicate is that the window of time for action is limited and soon. The Legislature starts work basically by Martin Luther King Jr. day (January 13, to be specific). And most committee work is done by the week after Valentine's Day. So that's just 6 weeks to get dialed in and get involved. And the bill has to pass out of one chamber by the Ides of March (actually March 12). And while "committee work" may not sound very exciting, that's were we want these bills to die. The floor votes happen if the bills get out of committee and once the Party gets officially behind a bill, it becomes much harder to stop. Everything tends to be quite fast paced for folks who don't do this "politics stuff" for a living.

Another thing to be aware of is that there will probably be 8-10 2A bills dropping initially. That's a lot for a regular guy to keep track of. Typically, either through limited time or due to grassroots effort, those get whittled down to 2 or 3 which the Ruling Party really wants to prioritize. I would encourage you to make your voice heard early on any and all of them, but if that's too much, stay tuned in the next newsletter where I'll try to highlight where the key battles are shaping up. Or just pick one bill that really bothers you and focus early and hard on that one.

To see all the pre-filed bills: <u>https://app.leg.wa.gov/billinfo/prefiled.aspx?year=2025</u>. There are already 2 alarming ones: one to stop "bulk purchases" of guns and ammo and another to make it even harder to run a gun shop.

To stay on top of particular bills so you can get involved, I'd recommend Bill Kirk first for awareness and info and then the Conservative Ladies of Washington's Legislative Action Center (<u>https://conservativeladiesofwa.com/legislative-action-center</u>) for more details on how to help. And the leg.wa.gov website lets you sign up to be notified on the status of a particular bill. Remember bills can start in either the house or senate here.

You can either contact your two representatives and I senator (recommended), or you can find out which committee is processing the bill you're tracking and contact everyone in the committee. If you've got the

time and inclination, you can put your name down to speak on a bill which gets a hearing in committee. You can speak remotely or in person.

One thing that might "save us" this year is that the Democrats have recently revealed that they have a massive budget deficit -- which was concealed until after the election -- so hopefully they'll have to spend their time and energy figuring that out.

I realize this political involvement stuff is tedious and boring but if we want to continue to live here freely, this is the season to get involved.

Trustees Report:

Our taxes were filed today.

Our January meeting will be on Thursday, January 2nd.

Joe R. said we need get into the shotgun safe and clean all the guns. Patty said we could have the youth come in and clean our firearms. John S. and Scott will get together and go through the shotguns to find out which ones are working.

Patty mentioned that many people who took advantage of our promotion last year are renewing this year.

Old Business:

Patty has not had a chance to look into the gate yet. She should be able to have something by the February meeting. Joe R. asked where we were at with defining the social media director. Martin said we have not done anything about this. Decking status - Dave R. said we have not gotten an updated quote. The contractor will come here this week to review the added work and update the quote. We believe everything will still be in the budget that was approved. We will start doing the work in January.

John hasn't had a chance to provide Martin the details on what to ask membership for related to the youth shotguns. John S. will get something for Martin. Scott suggested while Joe R. and Dave L. are at the Shot Show, they should visit some vendors to see if they are willing to donate some shotguns. Dave R. and Martin M. got surveys back on what training members wanted. So, they will be working on the classes for 2025. Joe R. asked if we got any requests for selfdefense. Martin said we had some interest. Joe R. said that once the new bylaws go into effect, all emergency procedures need to be turned into policy.

Underwriters for our insurance do not see any issues with our new by-laws. All committee members are only covered if appointed by the board and this appointment is captured in the minutes.

Tablets have been purchased as approved by the board for use for electronic signing of Waiver forms to import them directly into RGP. Will be introduced beginning with NRA classes and then released range wide after ensuring conformity.

We are unable to purchase Gift cards for our annual donation for the Domestic Violence Services of Snohomish County. There are accounting issues that prevent this. In lieu of gift cards, we will be donating a \$1500 check to their program.

New Business:

14 certified NRA Instructors have replied favorably to the survey. Instructors will be attending future NRA classes to learn our policies and procedures and sharpen their presentation skills. This will help us achieve our goal of increasing our training and education offerings and bringing new enthusiasm into our instructor ranks. We had 4 instructors complete the NRA Metallic cartridge instructor class. This gives us the opportunity to fully staff monthly NRA metallic cartridge reloading classes. We will begin advertising class availability Jan 2025.

Greg Burke would like to reserve the clubhouse on 3 Feb at 6 PM for Brian Suddaby Safaris presentation. This will be like last year; we have coordinated with archery to make this time work. We need to set a date in April or May for lead reclamation and bullet trap maintenance in the clubhouse. Need to plan on using some air chisels to break up the lead for removal, as we had to use hand chisels before. The lead tends to compact over time. Dave L. suggested we consider increasing our prices because the consumer price index is 3% this year. Joe M. and Patty thought we should not increase rates. They think we should take a year off. Martin moves we keep our prices the same for now. Scott Ray seconded. Passed. Joe R. suggested we put in the newsletter that we will not be raising our rates this year.

Dave L. said we need to provide a Beneficial Owners Report to the government. This has been in effect for 4 years, but this year is going to be the first year the US government will be fining people.

Joe R. said he would like to know who from the board is going to run again in 2025. Please let him know.

Martin moves we buy one set of 3 air rifle targets that were presented by John Woolley. Joe R. seconded. Passed. Patty left the meeting so we could discuss Jacqueline Woolley's proposal. Joe R. suggested an amount. Dave L. suggested we be consistent with our other youth donations. We discussed it further. Gabe moved to donate \$2,000 to Jacqueline. Dave L. seconded. Passed.
