together. For those of you who shoot shotgun you already know just how expensive the sport has become. Since we have become 501-C-3 we are far more capable to help in defraying the initial cost of getting started in shooting trap, continental and five stand. We were on a mission to find a deal on shotguns that the club could purchase for the beginning youth shooters interested in shotgun shooting sports. It was somewhat discouraging to find out that there is very little available specifically for youth shooters. This is my second observation in that it seems the major shotgun companies are not encouraging their research and development departments to specifically make shotguns for youth shooters. In one such conversation with one company it seemed like I was informing that the future of shooting sports in general lies with the upcoming generations. Unless the youth are exposed to the fun and challenge of the shooting sports we may well be spelling the demise of the sport in the future. On a positive note we did find one company that not only agreed with this insight but were willing to help us with discounts and equipment that is designed for youth shooters. Unless the shotguns fit right the experience of learning can be less than comfortable and sometimes downright painful resulting in sore shoulders or worse yet bruised cheek bones.

I want to reiterate that we are still looking for folks willing to run for the board. It is important beyond what the average member might suspect. The direction of the club going

forward is imperative to have solid members willing to provide leadership by volunteering for a board position. Please consider running for a board position.

Lastly, I would be remiss if I didn't mention February being special with the celebration of Valentine's Day. Don't forget or you might find yourself in the proverbial dog house. 
SAFARI AND GUIDED HUNTS

DONATIONS AND MATCHING FUNDS

As club members, we can get corporate matching from our employers of donations we make to the club. Some employers will also donate funds based on volunteer hours performed by employees or retirees. As an

example, Boeing will cash match up to 100% with a minimum, of \$25.00. Volunteer time is paid at \$100.00 per 10 hours worked. Or if teams of 5 or more are volunteering, it is \$20.00 per hour, per team member. Boeing will match 100% per employee per year to a maximum of \$10,00.00 for active employees, and 50% match up to \$3,00 per year for retirees. Check with your employer to see if they offer corporate matching. This could be a good source for donations, as well as increased exposure and recruiting opportunities.

HOUSEKEEPING

Our club is not just a location, it is the sum of all of us and all of our interests. We have to cooperate to keep everything running well. Recently, we have seen range equipment such as benches and mats left scattered around on Range 1. We even found torn-up paper and used cleaning patches dumped on the shooting platform. Our maintenance crew empties the trash cans, but this kind of thing is up to us. Not many of us would visit a friend, rearrange the furniture, and dump trash in their house.

If we see something out of place, we as members are there, we can fix it. Whether it is a dropped target or a broken target support, now is the best time to take care of it. If it is too much to deal with, let the rangemasters know.

POLITICS AND LEGISLATION

Now that the club has changed its status to 501 C 3, we need to make sure we are following the applicable laws for that status. The main considerations for this article will be political and lobbying activity.

Fortunately, the rules are pretty clear, even if they may be misunderstood. The club has to be concerned with two forms of lobbying – direct and grassroots lobbying.

Direct lobbying is through communication directed to a member or employee of a legislative body, it must refer to specific legislation, and it must reflect a view on such legislation. Lobbying concerning a referendum or ballot initiative is considered direct lobbying since the public is acting as a legislative body for these.

Grassroots lobbying is an effort to affect the opinions of the public or any part of the public, it must refer to specific legislation, must reflect a view on such legislation, and encourage the public to act on such legislation. Voter registration activity does not constitute lobbying.

There are spending limits to either form of lobbying, but since we spend nothing on either form of lobbying, we are well under the limits. As an organization, we do not communicate on legislative issues with our legislators or their staff. We also do not communicate with the general public on issues, as our newsletter is a communication to our members.

The club can not endorse or oppose candidates.

These rules do not limit the ability of club members, board members, or staff members to lobby or engage in political activities, on their own time and at their own expense.

We will do our best to keep members informed on what is going on in Olympia and around the state.

With the elections over, our new legislature is trying to put its mark on our laws. Here are bills that have been filed for this session. They are in various states of progress through the system, but you may want to look them up. They are (so far):

Yet Another Permit to Buy a Gun (HB 1163 and SB 5140). This bill, which would require live-fire training before getting a permit to buy a gun, and the only one so far with a companion bill in each chamber, and the House Bill has 32 co-sponsors, indicating it's a priority. It has had a committee hearing in the House but not the Senate yet. Contact your Senator and ask them to oppose. They added the online permit requirement in the last session. It's clear they want to ratchet up the permitting requirements little by little each session.

Purchase Limits of Guns and Ammo (HB 1132). This bill, which would limit you to buying 1,000 rounds a month, regardless of caliber, has 27 co-sponsors and doesn't yet have a companion bill in the Senate. It has had a committee hearing in the House. Focus on your 2 State Representatives.

Firearm Storage Mandates (HB 1152). This House bill has 34 co-sponsors so far, though no companion bill in the Senate. It requires you to keep your guns "out of plain sight" in your home, even if you live alone. It's also gone through committee, so I recommend you focus on your 2 State Representatives.

Further Carry Restrictions (SB 5098). Like so many of these, this bill which adds even more "gun free zones" is an incremental addition to previous similar bills. It's all "death by 1,000 cuts". They don't want to pass everything they intend all at once. By doing it in smaller pieces, they hope to make it all harder to protest and resist. This Senate bill has 11 co-sponsors and no companion in the House. It is already out of Committee in the Senate. Contact your State Senator.

Bankrupting Firearms Dealers (SB 5099). This terrible bill is the next phase of the "Put FFLs Out of Business" bill they passed last year which has already caused 20% of FFLs to close their doors, even though that one doesn't go into effect until July. This one has 14 co-sponsors and is out of committee. It would set a minimum liability insurance, regardless of where or how you operate, and massively empower the WSP to intrusively enforce all the mandates in the previous bill. Tell your State Senator how you feel.

Gun and Ammo Tax of 11% (HB 1386). This bill is a direct tax of 11% on all guns, gun parts, and ammunition purchases. It's essentially a copy of what California did in 2023, and similar to what the city of Seattle did in 2016. It also has 32 co-sponsors in the House. It has not yet had a committee hearing so please sign in "CON" when it comes up in committee.

Insurance Requirement per Firearm (HB 1504). This bill just dropped a few days ago and has just 8 co-sponsors, but Democrat support seems to be building. It would require every gun owner to carry \$25,000 in liability coverage. PER FIREARM. There's no explanation as to why one would need to carry liability insurance if one is complying with all these other laws which they claim reduce the risk of anything bad happening with one's firearms. This bill seems clearly designed to make low income people unable to exercise their 2A rights.

And on a related note, similar but less intrusive bills are HB 1118 Firearms Rights Restoration, SB5056 Back-up Background Check, and HB 1178, Removing sentencing enhancements, have also been filed.

JANUARY 2025 BENCHREST CENTERFIRE MATCH REPORT

There were a record breaking twenty-two contestants in this month's 300-yard benchrest match with nine contestants in the Sharpshooter Division and thirteen in the Expert Division.

This was the first month of the two-relay format to accommodate the field which exceeded the 18 bench limit. The first relay consisted of the thirteen Expert Division shooters and four Sharpshooters. The second relay consisted of five Sharpshooters.

To accommodate the larger fields, the target boards were rebuilt to accommodate two targets. The competitors shoot targets one and two with a five-minute break between then followed by shooting targets three and four with the same five-minute break.

The weather conditions were clear skies, very calm winds with a temperature of 28 degrees at the start of the match.

Proposed amendments shall become effective immediately upon approval of the motion to accept at that meeting. A twothirds vote of the Members in attendance shall be necessary to approve the amendment.

3) Change section 9.2 by adding the following text:

paragraph 9.3.
