I don't mean to sound lecturing but this club belongs to us all who are members, and it is our responsibility to nurture the club beyond just paying annual dues. This year marks our eighty-year anniversary. I will repeat that in numeric example. 80 YEARS! In my opinion that should be celebrated. Is there anyone who would like to form a committee to organize this anniversary event sometime this summer? I could go on and on about what I believe the challenges are going to be going forward as a club but the folks taking over are very competent and will deal with those things accordingly.

As a farewell gesture I would like to say that it has been my honor to be the president of this club which is true. To that extent, it is also a little too cliché and perhaps corny in my opinion. The truth for me was it was more being a part of history of this club. Not too long ago a very aged member and former club president died. His family, recognizing how important the club meant to him, looked into having a memorial ceremony here at the club. Being part of history is no small measure of esteem in my assessment.

ARCHERY UPDATE

The Archery Season is in full Swing. The indoor "Vegas Shoot" is held in Las Vegas in the first week of March. Around 4000 archers attend every year. Included in that number is about 15-16 of our own club members. We don't expect everyone to go to Las Vegas to shoot, but you can shoot in local tournaments. Here are a few we suggest:

March 29-30 Silver Arrow Bowman -Marked Distance on Animals and Targets April 5-6 Grays Harbor Bowman - Safari Shoot Marked distances on Targets April 26-27 Cedar River Bowman - Safari Shoot Marked distances on Targets Archery Chair Gabriel Shank is happy to explain the rules and tell you details on what to expect if you go to one of these tournaments. Grays Harbor and Cedar River both offer free primitive camping onsite. Bring the family, it's a lot of fun. Over the next few months those shooting the Flat Range and Walk Through course will see a lot of Orange Dots on certain targets. This is in preparation of the (Orange Dot) Safari Tournaments. Many of our archery club members attend these tournaments including the National Redding Marked 3D held May 2-4. Walk the course and see how you stack up. Two arrows into an orange dot on each target!

The club has ordered 20 new hay bale targets for the Walk Through course. They will arrive in March. Look for a notice asking for volunteers to place them on the course. The hay target bales are very heavy and any assistance will be appreciated. Keep an eye out for people shooting broadheads into our targets. Broadheads are only allowed on personal targets, the sandpits, or the provided small black blocks that are scattered on the flat range. Anyone shooting into our 48"x48" targets with broadheads should be reported to the range master immediately.

SHOTGUN UPDATE

We had a good number of people attend our last Shotgun Committee Meeting. We did testing of the Blacklight Clay Shooting equipment on Trap 3. It was well received by the members who came out to shoot it.

Greg Thomas and I are working on the final configuration, and will report back after finalizing the setup.

We are still discussing the Junior Shotgun Team. We are looking for candidates for the coaching positions. We ask that anyone who would like to assist with the team, contact us and discuss the requirements. There is training for the coaches, and we want to insure that our coaches are well trained in the skills.

Please reach out if you would like to coach, donate or assist in the program, as well as promote it to junior shooters that you know. We are discussing the possibility of continuing with the PITA Multiplexes. There has been some decline in participation over the last few months, and Andrew Gough, who ran the shoots, has stepped back from it. Fred Harmon has expressed an interest in it and reached out to Kay at PITA. He will work on promoting the events, and see if we can keep it going. There are discussions about setting up some 50 bird tournaments for trap on a monthly basis, as club events to bring more shooters into the competition shooting arena in a casual manner. This could be done as a 50 or 100 bird doubles shoot on a regular basis as well. We can add Handicap, Continental and 5-Stand, depending on the interest. If we can put it together as a fun shoot on different days, we can see how many want to move towards registered shoots as they get more practice.

We welcome any ideas from the members on shoots or practice sessions that we could schedule for regular get togethers. We are here to serve our members and the public with opportunities to practice their shooting skills as well as the social aspects of getting together with other shooters.

The Shotgun Basics program has received a good number of volunteer mentors, as well as interest in the classes. These are geared towards a beginning shooter, who has not shot clays before. This would be the first class, which would get the participants fully oriented to shotguns, and would prepare them for the Shotgun Fundamentals Class to further their skills. Please pass this on to any beginning shotgun shooters you encounter. 5-Stand Fundamentals class will be explored. We had a potential instructor for it, and his other time commitments should be ending. I will contact him, and see what we can do. Any 5-Stand shooters who would like to mentor or assist with the classes would be greatly appreciated. The goal is to bring more people into this fun and challenging shooting discipline. If we have more shooters, we can make improvements, while keeping the costs at a reasonable level.

PISTOL UPDATE

Our indoor pistol postal league finished their season, with our lead squad coming in fourth, out of 66 squads from 23 different clubs in the Inland Empire Rifle and Pistol Association. We had four squads in this league, and there were clubs participating from Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Arizona, Montana, and Texas.

Our outdoor bullseye pistol season starts on April 10th at 7:00 on Range 3. Come out and improve your shooting!

PROJECT APPLESEED PRESENTS 'THREE STRIKES OF THE MATCH'



April 2025 marks the semiquincentennial of the first day of the American Revolutionary War. On Sunday April 6th from 12 noon to 2pm in the WCW Clubhouse, join the passionate storytellers from Project Appleseed to hear the true story behind the events of April 19th 1775, in a presentation we call 'The Three Strikes of the Match'. Some may have heard the basic story from school many years ago but most have not. Can you answer these questions?

When and where was the American Revolution fought and won?

When and where did the Revolutionary War actually start?

What caused the professional British Army to break and run from colonial farmers and shopkeepers?

Who fired the first shots on Lexington Green?

What did Paul Revere really say as he made his midnight ride?

We will tell the story in detail. Hear about life in the British colonies, Paul Revere's midnight ride, the lesser known riders who joined him, the message they carried on horseback (Spoiler, it was not "the British are coming!"), how the sacrifices made by militiamen, their families, and entire communities uniquely defined American Liberty, and how four brass cannon started an eight year war for independence. Get to see historical rifles, maybe even a cannon, and learn how the technique needed to be a skilled Rifleman has evolved since then. Most

importantly, discover the passion which was exhibited on April 19th 1775 is still alive and working to make this nation a better place for all who seek it.

There were 16 contestants in this month's benchrest match with ten in the Expert Division and six in the Sharpshooter Division.

The Wally Seibert Trophy match is a 50 shots for record competition contested at 100 and 200 yards with one shot for record at each of the five record bulls on each of five target sheets at both of the distances with unlimited sighters allowed.

Winds were gusting up 15 mile per hour on the range with temperatures in the low 50's.

100 yard targets:

Guest topics:

Steve Reed came to discuss the new process for the pistol league doing rapid fire. He wanted to make sure they would not get kicked out of the range if the range was full and another customer came in. Joe R. said that was not the intention. They will not get kicked out. The intent is they will not kick out people who are already in the lanes when all the lanes are full.

Rob Bush came to share information about our insurance. We adjusted the value of the buildings within the last year or 2. Rob suggested reviewing the value of the buildings and properly annually. Maintenance:

Range office deck demolition completed.

Next step is completion of all County permit submissions. Pending updated drawing with additional county requirements from architect.

Training and Education:

First Steps Shotgun classes have been scheduled twice per month starting March 2025. Shotgun mentors have volunteered to provide 1:1 student to mentor ratio for all firing line activities. Students will actively receive personalized coaching on the firing line.

Home Firearms Safety classes continue to be fully booked.

Rifle Report:

The following content was provided by Martin Morehouse and was shared outside of the board meeting.

Events scheduled:

Rifle matches for the coming month are Rimfire Benchrest on 1 March, Project Appleseed Rimfire Clinic on 8-9 March, Centerfire Benchrest match on 15 March, CMP Games Rifle Match on 16 March, and ARA Rimfire on 29 March. The Junior Rifle group will also have IERPA postal matches on 2, 7 and 9 March.

Our next NRA Basic Rifle Class is on 22 – 23 March 2025.

Indoor smallbore practice is on the calendar on Tuesdays from 6 to 9 PM. See me for

more information.

Meeting attendance:

Two members attended this month. Our next joint Rifle/Pistol Committee meeting will be on 24 February.

Special Use Process:

Eight members attended the rifle special use class in February. The March Rifle Special Use range session is on the 23d.

New Business:

Range request -

The Intro to Highpower Competition class held on 16 February, for members, went well, with eleven students and two instructors. Will plan another class later in the year.

Safety or Maintenance Concerns:

There was an incident on Range 2 on Sunday, 2 March. A shooter had an apparent squib, and another shooter was helping clear it. It appears to have actually been a stuck cartridge, and they tried to clear it with a rod from the rear, firing the cartridge. The assisting shooter got powder particles embedded in his hand, was treated and released. I expect all involved learned from this incident.

We need to set a date in April or May for lead reclamation and bullet trap maintenance in the clubhouse. Need to plan on using air chisels to break up the lead for removal, as we had to use hand chisels before. The lead tends to compact over time. Jeff McGee/Non-Ferrous Metals, Inc has offered to melt, cast, and package the recovered clubhouse lead for us, for no charge once it is cleaned out.

Shotgun Report:

The following content was provided by Fred Harmon and was shared outside of the board meeting.

We had a good number of people attend our last Shotgun Committee Meeting. We did testing of the Blacklight Clay Shooting equipment on Trap 3. It was well received by the members who came out to shoot it. Greg Thomas and I are working on the final configuration, and will report back after finalizing the setup. We will be discussing the auxiliary lighting to insure that the

shoots are done in a manner that insures the safe handling of the guns, and that RSO's can clearly see what is going on at the firing line

We are still discussing the Junior Shotgun Team. We are looking for candidates for the coaching positions. We ask that anyone who would like to assist with the team, contact us and discuss the requirements. There is training for the coaches, and we want to insure that our coaches are well trained in the skills. We have had someone express a desire to administrate the program and assist us with the required paperwork to form the team and to set up sponsorship programs to assist with the team expenses. This is an important step to help our junior shooters into the competition world, and we hope to help them progress on to future opportunities in scholarships and other rewards, as well as promoting shooting sports to a larger audience. Please reach out if you would like to coach, donate or assist in the program, as well as promote it to junior shooters that you know. We are discussing the possibility of continuing with the PITA Multiplexes. There has been some decline in participation over the last few months, and Andrew Gough, who had ran the shoots, has stepped back from it. Fred Harmon has expressed an interest in it and reached out to Kay at PITA. He will work on promoting the events, and see if we can keep it going. There are discussions about setting up some 50 bird tournaments for trap on a monthly basis, as club events to bring more shooters into the competition shooting arena in a casual manner. This could be done as a 50 or 100 bird doubles shoot on a regular basis as well. We can add Handicap, Continental and 5-Stand, depending on he interest. If we can put it together as a fun shoot on different days, we can see how many want to move towards registered shoots as they get more practice.

We welcome any ideas from the members on shoots or practice sessions that we could schedule for regular get togethers. We are here to serve out members and the public with opportunities to practice their shooting skills as well as the social aspects of getting together with other shooters.

The Shotgun Basics program has received a good number of volunteer mentors, as well as interest in the classes. These are geared towards a beginning shooter, who has not shot clays before. This would be the first class, which would get the participants fully oriented to shotguns, and would prepare them for the Shotgun Fundamentals Class to further their skills. Please pass this on to any beginning shotgun shooters you encounter. 5-Stand Fundamentals class will be explored. We had a potential instructor for it, and his other time commitments should be ending. I will contact him, and see what we can do. Any 5-Stand shooters who would like to mentor or assist with the classes would be greatly appreciated. The goal is to bring more people into this fun and challenging shooting discipline. If we have more shooters, we can make improvements, while keeping the costs at a reasonable level.

Manager's Report:

Robert Haverstock presented.

Robert got a phone call from the renters and they want to come back in at some point. They purchased a good amount of ammunition. We have a new renter, and they may rent again.

We have a new employee starting on Friday. Robert is still looking for an employee for rifle and pistol on weekends.

He would like to get a new washer for the house. Dave L. said Robert should just go buy a new washer and dryer.

Robert said he needs \$130,000 for ammunition. This will need to be in the budget for the next fiscal year.

He will be working on inventory this month. Dave L. said we need the forklift serviced. We also need to have the lawn mower and other equipment serviced. Robert will work on that.

We were fined \$800 by L&I.

The flat range lights seem to have a problem. Dave R. said he will be looking at them.

They found dry rot in the deck so they will need to do some additional work. We are

still working on getting the permit submitted for review.

Treasurer's Report:

Joe Maggiora presented.

Joe got a lot of volunteers for the finance committee. All the financials look good to Joe M. He is meeting with our accountant next week. Our taxes are being filed. For now, we are taking in state donations only.

Directors Report:

John Sutton presented.

One thing we have not talked about yet today is about Patty being on the board and being an employee. Joe R. said this is not ideal. There is someone else who is interested in becoming Recording Secretary which would help with this.

Old Business:

Joe R. was able to work out a deal with SKB Shotguns. We are getting two of one model and 4 of another model. With these we will be able to support small stature and larger stature shooters. One shotgun will be donated by a member and the rest will be \$9,000 total. Joe Rinaldi moved we purchase the 5 shotguns for \$9,000. Joe Maggiora seconded. Passed.

New Business:

Martin will send out a separate email to the members informing people we need people to volunteer for board positions.

Everyone needs to be called directors in my meeting minutes. Dale will make these changes in the minutes.
